

# **The Plaza Saloon**

**103 Sacramento Street**

- 1859 – Before the 1859 fire, Isadore Davidson and Tobias Jones had their cigar and confectionary store here.**
- 1859 – A disastrous fire destroyed fifty-eight frame buildings.**
- 1860 – Davidson and Jones sold their property with a building on it to A. P. Craner.**
- 1866 – Anton and Eliza Adrian bought the building to use as a lodging house next to their Auburn Restaurant.**
- 1887 – Mrs. Adrian sold the building to Lee & Watters for their Arcade Saloon.**
- 1894 – The Leary Brothers opened the Plaza Saloon and Lunch House here.**
- 1907 – William Christy sold the Plaza Saloon to Olsen Christiansen.**
- 1908 – Christiansen sold the Plaza Saloon to Ole Hesbol.**
- 1914 - Ole Hesbol sold the Plaza Saloon to M. J. Nunes and J. B Watters.**
- 1926 – The local Japanese community bought the building to use as a Buddhist Church and school.**
- 1928 – They added a Japanese language school here.**
- 1942 – The church and school were forced to close after the beginning of the second World War when people of Japanese heritage on the West Coast were forced into internment camps.**
- 1951 – Katsuichi “George” and Tomo Tsuda purchased this building in 1951 after they returned from the camps. They opened a grocery store here.**
- 2007 – Tsuda’s closed its doors after nearly 60 years at this location.**
