



**1591 Lincoln Way**

- 1855** – A fire destroyed all the wooden buildings here. The group of merchants who had their businesses here before the fire quickly began the construction of these brick buildings.
- 1856** – Davidson & Marks Company had their dry goods store here.
- 1858** – Tinsmith John Van Mater bought the building and rented it to John O'Neill and Lawrence O'Reilly who established their popular Headquarters Saloon here.
- 1868** – G. W. Curl owned the building and rented it to the Kind Brothers for their dry goods store.
- 1875** – Moses Andrews and Orrin W. Hollenbeck opened their banking house. They were also jewelers and ran the Wells, Fargo & Co. office. Hollenbeck had previously established the mining camp of Gold Run, one of the most successful hydraulic mining camps in the area.
- 1887** – Hollenbeck took over after Andrews died. He continued to run the banking house and was elected county treasurer.
- 1892** – Black Monday – Hollenbeck's bank was found insolvent. The county and many of Hollenbeck's friends lost money. His popularity among his peers caused a hung jury at his trial. He was a destroyed man and quickly left town.
- 1906** – Thomas James, the saloon owner and restaurateur bought this entire block. He would rent it out until the 1940s when it sold again.
- 1990** – Café Delicias was here.
